Field Trips

Saturday, February 1 Castlewood Canyon State Park Leader: Laurie Duke, 303-646-4699

The trip will involve hiking over trails but leader will try to avoid icy areas so wear good hiking shoes.

Meet leader at 7:45 a.m. at E. 88th and the South Platte River (parking lot just south of the intersection of 88th and Colorado).

We will check the duck population of this winter river habitat, any overhead raptors, and any other bird that flaps our way while we walk along paved flat trails (2–4 miles).

This will be a half-day trip, birding until noon or shortly thereafter. Dress for predicted weather. Bring water, snacks, binocs, and scopes.

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The Passion and the Payoff: Why We Band Birds and What We Are Learning

Meredith McBurney, RMBO Biologist, will be the featured speaker at the Monday, January 27 meeting of DFO.

The sheer joy of sharing a moment, up close and personal, with a bird before releasing it back into the wild is at the heart of what drives every bird bander to rise each morning before dawn, spend long hours at the banding station, and deal with occasional bad weather and boring days with no birds.

But the really big deal, and the more difficult work, is figuring out how to use the data obtained from capturing, marking, assessing, and releasing birds to better protect these birds that we love.

Meredith will take us through the evolving world of bird "banding"—from Audubon's work in the early 1800s, through the traditional process of marking with numbered bands, to the cutting edge technology of geolocators, radio telemetry, and genetic and stable-isotope markers.

She will share information about what RMBO and other research organiza-Continued on page 8

Future birders inspired, thanks to grant

During the 2012 and 2013 grant years, the DFO board awarded \$9000 divided between nine worthy grants. When taken all together these grants have included all aspects of our mission statement: education, research, and conservation.

One grant that was particularly fun and rewarding was made to Kunsmiller Creative Arts Academy (Denver Public Schools) for \$1000 to purchase binoculars and bird field guides to be used in their science program. Kunsmiller is located near Harvey Park in southwest Denver.

Dozens and dozens of middle school students have benefited from this grant as you can see from some of the children's own words



and artwork below. Each letter was addressed to "Dear Denver Field Ornithologists."

Rocks Park). Stay right at the first
fork. Continue on Red Rocks Road
approximately a mile to the Trading Post.

2013 Denver CBC Highlights

The 2013 Denver Christmas Bird Count (CBC) took place on December 14th, the 60th consecutive year that the Denver Field Ornithologists has conducted a Christmas count within the same 15-mile diameter count circle established in 1954 and centered just north of the old Ken Caryl Ranch entrance.

The weather on count day started clear and became mostly clear with calm to low winds. It was a beautiful day to be out with the team reporting a respectable 22,870 individual birds of 93 species recorded by 148 field observers and 15 feeder watchers.

No new species were added to the cumulative Denver CBC list in 2013. The grand total of species seen since 1954 thus remains at 199.

"Rare" birds (seen on less than 10% of the previous counts) found this year included:

Brant (2nd record) in Area 8,

Northern Saw-whet Owl (4th record) found in Area 7a,

Chihuahuan Raven (3rd record) in Area 3, and

Gray Catbird (5th and 6th records) one seen in Area 7a and one in Area 7b.

"Uncommon" birds (seen 10–24% of the previous counts) found this year included:

Cackling Goose (multiple areas—split and tracked starting in 2004),

Long-tailed Duck (two birds seen in Area 4b),

Eurasian Collared-Dove (multiple areas—recent explosive addition to the annual count),

Say's Phoebe (Area 3),

Clark's Nutcracker (Area 15), and

Golden-crowned Sparrow (Area 1).

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Sunday, February 16 Roxborough State Park Leader: Doris Cruze, 303-798-8072

Meet leader at 8 a.m. at the Visitor's Center for a 3.5-hour walking tour on an easy trail.

Participants should see Golden Eagles and species common in the foothills.

State Parks Pass required or \$5 entrance fee per car. Lunch will be optional but there is a beautiful place to sit on the patio and watch the birds as you eat lunch.

Take S. Wadsworth Blvd. past Chatfield SP to Waterton Rd on left. Take Waterton Rd. 1.6 miles east to North Rampart Range Rd., turn right and go south 2.3 miles to Roxborough Park Rd. Turn left and follow signs to the park (2.2 miles).

This is an excellent trip for novice birders and new members.

Saturday, February 22 Chatfield State Park Leader: Ed Holub, 303-979-2194

Meet leader at 8 a.m. inside west entrance of park off S. Wadsworth, 1.5 miles south of C-470. This will be a half-day trip so lunch is optional. **Call leader if going**.

Sunday, February 23 Barr Lake State Park Leader: Gregg Goodrich, 303-655-9135

Meet leader at Barr Lake Visitors' Center at 8 a.m. Bring scopes, binoculars, water, and dress for the predicted weather.

Walk between 3 and 4 miles looking for waterfowl, and resident birds surviving winter. Lunch is optional. State parks pass required.


Thanks again, Sydni

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



eagle. With the \$1000 we got brochures about birds and binoculars. Thank you again.


